INFORMATION ABOUT VOTING ELECTION DAY 16 MAY 2018



ELECTION DAY: WEDNESDAY 16 MAY 2018

The Privileges and Procedures Committee is required to publish the background and policies of the candidates in the forthcoming elections in accordance with the provisions of the Public Elections (Expenditure and Donations) (Jersey) Law 2014. The information is provided by each of the candidates themselves and the views expressed are those of the candidates and NOT of the Privileges and Procedures Committee.

This booklet does not contain the manifestos of candidates who have been elected unopposed. These can be viewed on the candidate's page on www.vote.je.

ELECTION 2018

The elected members of the States of Jersey are Senators, Connétables and Deputies.

On 16 May 2018, we will elect 8 Senators, 1 Parish Connétable and 26 Deputies for a term of office of 4 years (11 Parish Connétables and 3 Deputies have already been elected unopposed).

SENATORS

There are 8 vacancies for Senator in this election. Senators have an Island-wide mandate. If you are registered to vote, you can vote in the Senators election.

The ballot paper for Senators will be white.

CONNÉTABLES

There is 1 remaining vacancy for Connétable in this election, in St Mary. The Connétable is the administrative head of the Parish. You can vote for the Connétable if you are registered to vote in St Mary. The Connétables in the other 11 Parishes have already been elected uncontested. The ballot paper for the Connétables will be blue.

DEPUTIES

There are 26 remaining vacancies for Deputies in this election (3 Deputies have already been elected unopposed). Deputies are elected in 17 districts corresponding to Parish boundaries or administrative districts within the Parish. You can vote for the Deputy or Deputies who are standing in the district where you are registered to vote, unless a candidate or candidates have already been elected uncontested. The ballot paper for Deputies will be green.

HUSTINGS MEETINGS

The dates and venues of all candidate hustings meetings will be listed on **www.vote.je**. All of the meetings will be filmed and will be uploaded to the website for viewing.

REGISTER TO VOTE

You have to be registered in order to vote. Anyone who was registered on the main Electoral Register can vote before election day at a pre-poll station.

If your name is not on the main Electoral Register, you can put your name on the Supplementary Register (before noon on Wednesday 9 May 2018) and you will be able to vote on election day. You can register online at **www.vote.je/register.**

VOTING BEFORE ELECTION DAY

If you are registered you can vote before Election Day at:

VOTING ON ELECTION DAY

You can vote on Election Day, Wednesday 16 May, at your Parish or district polling station, which will be open from 8am to 8pm.

^{*} There is one election in the Districts of St Helier No. 3 and No. 4. Voters in those districts cast their votes at different polling stations on Election Day, depending on what district they live in.

If you live in St. Helier, St. Saviour or St. Brelade and you are not sure which district polling station to attend, you can find out on **www.vote.je** or by contacting your Parish Hall.



CASTING YOUR VOTES AT A POLLING STATION

When you arrive at the polling station or pre-poll voting station you will be asked for your name. You should have some identification with you such as a driving licence or passport. You will then be asked which of the elections you wish to vote in (Senators, Deputies and/or Connétables). You will be given ballot papers.

You will then go to the voting booth to cast your vote by putting an 'x' beside the name(s) of your preferred candidate(s).

VOTING BY POST

If you will be out of the Island on Election Day you can apply to vote by post.

Postal voting forms can be downloaded from **www.vote.je** or requested from your Parish Hall. For posting off Island you must return your application form by noon on Tuesday 8 May 2018. For posting locally you must return your application form by noon on Friday 11 May 2018. Application forms should be sent to:

When the Judicial Greffe receives your application, they will send you everything that you need to cast your vote:

- You will receive your ballot papers and a ballot paper envelope. Mark an 'x' in the box alongside the name(s) of your preferred candidate(s) then fold the ballot papers and put them inside the ballot paper envelope.
- 2. Fill out and sign the declaration of identity form.
- 3. Put the ballot paper envelope and the declaration of identity form inside the return envelope and post it back to the Judicial Greffe, to be received no later than noon on Wednesday 16 May 2018.

VOTING IF YOU ARE SICK OR DISABLED

If you know you will not be well enough to go to a polling station to vote then you can arrange to vote in advance by completing an application form for a pre-poll home visit. Application forms can be downloaded from **www.vote.je** or requested from your Parish Hall. Please return your completed application form for a pre-poll home visit by noon Thursday 10 May.

If you fall ill on 16 May 2018 and cannot make it to your polling station, please contact your Parish Hall as soon as possible and they will send an official to you to take your vote.

COMPLETING THE BALLOT PAPER

The ballot papers will be different colours:

Senators - white

Deputies - green

Connétables - blue

The number of candidates you may vote for depends on what election you are voting in.


Senators: You can vote for up to 8 candidates (see pages 8-16).

Connétables: You can vote for 1 candidate in the parish where you live unless a candidate has already been elected unopposed (see pages 47-48)

Deputies: You can vote for up to the total number of vacancies in your district unless candidates have already been elected unopposed (see your appropriate Parish/District pages).

ELECTIONS BALLOT PAPER

Here are example ballot papers for the elections of Senators, Connétables and Deputies:



The ballot paper will tell you the maximum number of candidates you may vote for. You do not need to use all of your votes. You can vote for just one candidate if you wish. When voting, you should put a cross in the box beside the name(s) of your preferred candidate(s).

DZIEŃ WYBORCZY 2018

NAJBLIŻSZE WYBORY RZĄDU PAŃSTWA JERSEY ODBĘDĄ SIĘ 16 MAJA 2018.

Wyspa Jersey przechodzi przez ciekawy okres w swojej historii. Wiele decyzji, które członkowie rządu muszą podjąć, bezpośrednio oraz pośrednio dotyczą Twojego życia na Jersey.

Przedstawiciele rządu debatują i decydują o istotnych sprawach dotyczących prawodawstwa, ustawodawstwa, polityki publicznej, opieki społecznej i budżetu państwa w Twoim imieniu. Należy być zarejestrowanym aby móc głosować. Rejestrując się teraz, zapewniasz sobie gwarancję oddania głosu w dniu wyborów lub możliwość głosowania w punktach przedwyborczych w tygodniach poprzedzających dzień wyborów.

Również możesz zarejestrować się do głosowania elektronicznie za pośrednictwem strony internetowej My Parish Online lub korzystając z linku v**ote.je/register**.

NA KOGO MOGĘ GŁOSOWAĆ?

Są 3 listy kandydatów do rządu, na których będziesz głosować:



SENATOR (SENATORÓW): Masz prawo głosować na maksymalną ilość 8 senatorów, którzy są wybierani przez wszystkich uprawnionych do głosowania mieszkańców Jersey

CONNÉTABLES (BURMISTRZÓW): Możesz głosować tylko na kandydatów z parisha w którym obecnie mieszkasz.

DEPUTIES (DEPUTOWANYCH): Możesz głosować tylko na kandydatów z parisha lub rejonu w którym obecnie mieszkasz. (Niektóre większe parishe, są podzielone na rejony).

JAK MOGĘ GŁOSOWAĆ?

GŁOSOWANIE PRZEDWYBORCZE (PRE-POLL)

Jeżeli zarejestrowałeś/aś się do wyborów przed 9 kwietnia 2018, możesz głosować już od 30 kwietnia 2018 do 14 maja od 8.30 do 17.15 w punkcie wyborczym w St. Paul Gate przy New Street, w pariszu St Helier. Punkt będzie zamknięty 7 maja w Bank Holiday (dzień wolny od pracy) oraz 9 maja 2018 roku w dniu święta wyzwolenia Jersey.

Weekendowe punkty przedwyborcze będą również dostępne dla wszystkich uprawnionych do głosowania w Trinity Youth Centre od 10.00 do 13.00 w sobotę 5 maja 2018 oraz w Communicare w St Brelade od 10.00 do 13.00 w sobotę 12 maja 2018.

GŁOSOWANIE W DNIU WYBORÓW (ŚRODA 16 MAJA)

W dniu wyborów możesz głosować w parishu w którym jesteś uprawniony do głosowania. W tym dniu punkty wyborcze w parishach będą otwarte od 8.00 do 20.00.

SKŁADANIE GŁOSU

W określonych okolicznościach możesz głosować w domu lub korespondencyjnie. Proszę skontaktuj się ze swoim parishem w sprawie objaśnień jak należy to zrobić. Głosowanie w przypadku choroby, niepełnosprawności albo trudności z czytaniem lub pisaniem.

Jeżeli jesteś zarejestrowany na listę uprawnionych do głosowania, ale jesteś chory, niepełnosprawny albo masz trudności z czytaniem lub pisaniem, w takim przypadku możesz oddać głoś zawczasu. Proszę skontaktuj się w tej sprawie z parishem w miejscu zamieszkania.

GŁOSOWANIE W PUNKTACH WYBORCZYCH

Aby wziąć udział w wyborach należy zabrać ze sobą dowód tożsamości ze zdjęciem np. paszport, dowód osobisty lub prawo jazdy. Będziesz przywitany przez członka komisji wyborczej, który po sprawdzeniu twojej tożsamości zaznaczy twoje imię na liście uprawnionych do głosowania oraz wręczy Tobie formularze wyborcze. Następnie będziesz mógł udać się do kabiny wyborczej, gdzie postawisz krzyżyk 'x' obok imienia i nazwiska swojego kandydata. Po wypełnieniu formularza wyborczego będziesz poproszony do wrzucenia go do urny wyborczej.

Urzędnicy parisha będą obecni w lokalach wyborczych i udzielą wszelkiej pomocy w przypadku jakichkolwiek pytań lub niejasności dotyczących udziału w głosowaniu.

WYPEŁNIANIE FORMULARZY WYBORCZYCH


Formularze do głosowania będą wydrukowane w różnych kolorach:

Senato (Senatorow) - w białym

Connétables (Constabli/Connétables) - w niebieskim

Deputies (Deputowanych) - w zielonym

Poniżej jest przedstawiony przykładowy wzór wypełniania formularza wyborczego:



Na formularzu wyborczym znajduje się informacja co do maksymalnej liczby kandydatów na których możesz głosować. Nie ma konieczności wypełniania wszystkich trzech formularzy. Można oddać głos tylko na jednego kandydata jeżeli taka jest wola wyborcy.

Oddając swój głos na poszczególnego/ych kandydata/ów należy postawić krzyżyk w okienku odpowiadającym temu kandydatowi.

EM QUEM POSSO VOTAR?

Existem 3 tipos de Membros do Governo em quem pode votar:



SENATOR (SENADORS): Todos os eleitores podem votar, no máximo, em 8 Senadores que sejam eleitos em toda a ilha.

CONNÉTABLES (REPRESENTANTE DA AUTORIDADE DA **JUNTA DE FREGUESIA):** Só pode votar nos Representantes da Autoridade da Junta de Freguesia (Connétable) onde vive.

DEPUTIES (DEPUTADOS):Só pode votar nos **deputados** da sua freguesia ou da região onde mora (algumas das freguesias maiores estão divididas em regiões).

COMO VOTAR

VOTAR ANTES DO DIA DAS ELEIÇÕES (SECÇÃO DE VOTO)

Qualquer pessoa que esteja inscrita no recenseamento eleitoral pode votar na assembleia de voto algumas semanas antes do dia da eleição. A assembleia de voto estará aberta a todos os eleitores em St Paul's Gate na New Street, St Helier das 8h:30 às 17h:15, na segunda-feira, 30 de abril e até às 14h:00 na segunda-feira, dia 14 de maio 2018. Encontra-se encerrada nos feriados de segunda-feira, dia 7 de maio e de quarta-feira, dia 9 de maio 2018.

As assembleias de voto encontram-se também disponíveis a todos os eleitores, em Trinity, no Centro da Juventude das 10h:00 às 13h:00, no sábado, dia 13 de maio 2018 e no Communicare em St Brelade das 10h:00 às 14h:00, no sábado, dia 12 de maio 2018.

VOTAR NO DIA DA ELEIÇÃO (QUARTA-FEIRA, 16 DE MAIO)

No dia da eleição, pode votar na junta de freguesia onde se encontra inscrito. As assembleias de voto estarão abertas no dia da eleição das 8:00 às 20h:00.

VOTAR POR CORREIO

Em certas circunstâncias, pode votar por correio ou em casa. Para mais informação, por favor, contacte a sua Junta de Freguesia.

VOTAR SE ESTIVER DOENTE, SE FOR INCAPACITADO OU TIVER DIFICULDADES EM LER E ESCREVER.

Se estiver inscrito para votar e está doente, for incapacitado ou tiver dificuldades em ler e escrever, poderá votar antecipadamente. Para mais informação, por favor, contacte a sua Junta de Freguesia.

VOTAR NAS ELEIÇÕES

No dia da eleição necessita de ter consigo um documento de identificação com fotografia atualizada, como por exemplo, carta de condução ou passaporte. Será cumprimentado pelo presidente da mesa que lhe entregará um boletim de voto. De seguida deve dirigir-se para a câmara de voto e aí deverá preencher com uma cruz (X) o quadrado que está à frente do candidato em que deseja votar. Ser-lhe-á pedido que introduza o seu boletim, devidamente dobrado, na urna.

Os representantes da Junta de Freguesia estarão na assembleia de voto para o/a poderem ajudar e esclarecer sobre questões que tenha.



- Deputies (Deputados) Verde

Os boletins de voto indicam o número máximo de candidatos em que pode votar. Não necessita de esgotar todas as sua escolhas. Pode, simplesmente, votar num só candidato, se assim desejar.. Quando votar, deve colocar uma cruz na quadrícula que se encontra ao lado do (s) nome (s) do (s) candidato(s) que prefere.

JOUR DES ÉLECTIONS 2018

LES PROCHAINES ÉLECTIONS GÉNÉRALES AURONT LIEU À JERSEY LE MERCREDI 16 MAI 2018.

L'île de Jersey vit une période intéressante. De nombreuses décisions que doivent prendre les membres des Etats vous affectent très directement et impactent votre vie quotidienne.

Les membres des Etats débattent de sujets d'intérêt général et prennent des décisions en votre nom concernant les lois, les règlements, les services publics et les dépenses publiques.

Vous devez être inscrit(e) sur les listes électorales pour avoir le droit de voter. En vous inscrivant dès maintenant, vous pourrez voter le jour des élections ou bien de manière anticipée dans les bureaux de vote spécifiquement mis en place pendant les semaines précédant le jour des élections.

Pour vous inscrire en ligne, rendez-vous sur **vote.je/register** ou bien vous pouvez compléter le formulaire d'inscription et le retourner aux services de votre paroisse. Si vous ne savez pas si vous êtes inscrit(e) sur les listes électorales, prenez contact avec les services de votre paroisse afin de vous en assurer.

POUR QUI PUIS-JE VOTER?

Vous pouvez voter pour 3 catégories de membres des Etats



SENATOR (SÉNATEURS): chaque électeur peut voter pour 8 sénateurs au maximum, qui sont élus par l'intégralité de l'île.

CONNÉTABLES (CONNÉTABLES): Vous pouvez seulement voter pour élire le Connétable de la paroisse dans laquelle vous résidez.

DEPUTIES (DEPUTES): Vous pouvez seulement voter pour élire les députés de la paroisse ou du district dans laquelle/lequel vous résidez. (Les paroisses les plus importantes sont divisées en districts).

COMMENT VOTER?

VOTE ANTICIPÉ, AVANT LE JOUR DES ÉLECTIONS (PRE-POLL)

Toute personne inscrite sur les listes électorales peut voter, de manière anticipée, durant les semaines précédant le jour des élections.

Le bureau de vote anticipé, pour tous les habitants de l'île, se situe à St Paul's Gate dans New Street, St Helier et sera ouvert de 8h30 à 17h15 à partir du lundi 30 avril (jusqu'à 14h) et jusqu'au lundi 14 mai 2018. Ce bureau est fermé lors des jours fériés : lundi 7 mai 2018 et mercredi 9 mai 2018, Jour de la Libération.

Des bureaux de vote anticipé seront également disponibles, pour tous les habitants de l'île, au Trinity Youth Centre de 10h à 13h le samedi 5 mai 2018 et au Communicare de 5t Brelade de 10h à 13h le samedi 12 mai 2018.

VOTER LE JOUR DES ÉLECTIONS GÉNÉRALES (MERCREDI 16 MAI 2018)

Vous pouvez voter le jour même des élections générales dans la Paroisse où vous êtes inscrit(e). Les isoloirs seront accessibles de 8h à 20h, le jour des élections, dans l'enceinte du bureau de vote de votre paroisse.

VOTE POSTAL

Dans certains cas particuliers il peut être possible de voter par voie postale ou à domicile. Merci de contacter les services de votre paroisse pour plus de renseignements. Voter lorsque l'on est malade, en situation de handicap, ou lorsque l'on a des difficultés à lire ou à écrire. Si vous êtes inscrit(e) sur les listes électorales et que vous êtes malade, en situation de handicap ou que vous avez des difficultés à lire ou à écrire, vous pouvez bénéficier du vote anticipé. Merci de contacter les services de votre paroisse pour plus de renseignements.

VOTER AUX ÉLECTIONS GÉNÉRALES

Lorsque vous irez voter, vous devrez présenter une pièce d'identité avec photographie tel un passeport ou un permis de conduire. Vous serez accueilli(e) par des membres du personnel qui pointeront votre nom sur les listes électorales et vous remettront un bulletin de vote. Vous pourrez ensuite vous rendre dans l'isoloir afin d'effectuer votre vote en apposant un "x" à côté des noms des candidats auxquels vous souhaitez apporter votre voix. Il vous sera enfin demandé de déposer votre bulletin papier dans l'urne prévue à cet effet. Les équipes paroissiales se trouveront dans les bureaux de vote et seront disponibles pour répondre à toutes vos questions.



SENATORS

On Wednesday 16 May 2018, the Island will elect 8 Senators for a term of office of 4 years.

That's why selecting candidates by the manifesto that most closely matches your ideals (as is usual) will no longer deliver.

You want change?



The projections by Statistics Jersey are that at 700 a year, by 2035 we shall require 185 Le Marais blocks and 6 new Primary Schools.

One of the reasons I brought an amendment to the MTFP in September 2016, after the by election, was to get a better profile of the taxpaying public and to improve the picture of the demographics of immigration. The Assembly did not support this although the tax department have started to investigate the information which we need urgently if we are to plan realistically for the future. There are trends affecting the future, there are preferences expressed by Islanders but without accurate information it is difficult realistically to combine these and make achievable plans.

If elected I will bring an urgent proposition to obtain this tax information before the new strategic plan is crystallised.

Without sound information it is difficult to coordinate the underlying

policies and strategies. If we carry on at 700 people a year, where will we house people? The rate at which we are building, 1261 houses over the past 4 years compares with immigration of 1400 over the same period? Andium and the Housing Trusts are making solid attempts to provide more housing but it is difficult to build reasonably sized dwellings because they are mainly being squeezed into the urban areas. This must be addressed in the 2020 Island Plan as must the long term development plan for St Brelades Bay. This was voted for twice by the States, and is an important policy to maintain the Bay as a Tourist destination.

The overlap between the Health and Social Services and Social Security Departments, is demonstrated by the current reviews for Social Security on capacity to work and the assessment of incapacity. These emphasise the necessity for more coordination and cooperation between departments,

a practice which should flourish under the plans put forward by the new Chief Executive.

Having been fortunate enough to attend university, I am keen that those of our students who are qualified should not be prevented because of funding. I will set out more detailed funding plans on my website and during hustings. I also want those who have practical talents not to be overlooked.



here , Noirmont, and other public areas with the power to issue a warning, and possibly on the spot fines for repeat offenders who do not have poo bags in their possession. Hopefully, this warden would have more of a deterrent effect than anything else.

Coastal development threat

I am totally against any further development on our coastline.

St Brelade's bay is under threat from developers wanting to maximize profit over the small remaining areas that are left, just a stones throw from the beach! This cannot be right. St Brelade's bay has seen more than it's fair share of property development over the past thirty years in particular. I say enough is enough, not just in St Brelade -but to the rest of Jersey's coastline.

Sea Lettuce

In St Aubin's bay we have this problem that reoccurs every year, that simply must be addressed. Work must be done to eliminate the scorce of nitrates flowing into the

bay which cause the problem, both from farmers fields and Bellozanne.

I support the SOS Jersey idea of placing oyster beds in the bay to help clean the sea of these nitrates.

The blight of sea lettuce every year does absolutely nothing to attract visitors to our shores- it must be tackled as a matter of urgency.

Recycling

I have long been a devotee of recycling.

I fully support the initiative to reduce the amount of unneccesary "one use" plastic packaging in shops.

We also need to improve our island wide recycling rate which in 2016 was only 31% - I wish to explore all possibilities to improve this. For example, we could extend facilities in car parks adjacent to the beaches. At the moment, everything (including glass) gets dumped in the same bin!

Additionally, recycling more of our waste to France would give us an exciting opportunity to develop French-Jersey relations, and should

prove to be environmentally & financially beneficial.

Les Quennevais Precinct

The precinct has over the past few years taken on a very run down look, with currently six retail outlets not let out to new business. These issues reflect badly on our parish and needs to be addressed with some imaginative thought on how it could be made more inviting and pleasant to shop around.

The Government's own Future St Helier project has so far yielded zero. Something's wrong when it takes so long to get things done. The time and money wasted and stress caused by Government backing rule-breaking, grotesquely inappropriate planning schemes such as the original for Gas Pace and the dreadful first plans for the Hospital is ridiculous. Things have to change.

Charlie Parker, now has oversight of Children's Services, give him the autonomy, au-thority, first call priority on personnel and resources and the £1,650,000 Care Inquiry Contingency for rapid response task force action. From giving a child a toothbrush or dai-ly nourishing meal to installing sanitation in a home, we must offer immediate help fol-lowed by long term assistance to recovery.

in shelters alongside men with seri-ous addictions is a pathway to disaster at the future expense of the state and their lives.

Approval has been granted to dense residential development with too little car parking; peripheral car parks should be planned to provide a balance of parking, for both residents and commuters, and greener streets with more trees, pavements, bus stops, cycle routes, and play zones.

Global Jersey

Jersey's international identity has been developing and, following Brexit, will further evolve. Our special link with the UK, based on mutual advantage and respect, should be enhanced by a higher status in the Commonwealth, autonomous global trading relationships, targeted overseas aid, and international recognition of Jersey's self-governing identity.

To bring legislation into effect more efficiently, it should be agreed with the Crown that Jersey laws of an uncontroversial nature may be assented to by the Lieutenant-Governor.

Education

Education is integral to the community, but must develop contacts to the wider economy. School facilities should be used most cost-efficiently to serve the whole community. Ministerial reorganisation has split education from culture; however heritage and arts should be at the heart of learning to support the development of the creative economy.

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Jersey in 2035 will have over 25,000 additional permanent residents and will require the equivalent of 230 Le Marais housing blocks to accommodate them.

Not an election candidate's wild speculation, but a forecast from a new Scrutiny panel report.

Unfortunately, residential housing is only one aspect of the massive problem of overpopulation that will destroy Jersey as we currently know it

I am aware that our government is already planning for a local population of 130,000 - a figure that has great significance

because, as Jersey approaches that population level, our infrastructure will no longer be able to cope.

130,000 residents will require a new reservoir, an additional sewerage works, another secondary school with according to Scrutiny - ten supporting primary schools, yet another hospital in addition to the one being designed now and, I can safely say, a number of significantly sized homes for the elderly, with facilities for dealing with the mentally impaired as well as the physically disabled.

You may well ask where all the capital funding is coming from, let alone the future running costs. I suggest it can only mean increased taxation.

The impacts will be dramatic and whilst residents of St Helier district No.3/4 may not have to worry about a new reservoir, current planning policy specifies that the Town will be the location for the bulk of all new residential construction.

"Brown field sites" will go first, there will then be pressure on filling in existing "open space" and a swathe of green fields will go under concrete. I will defend constituents from unacceptable encroachment, but if population increases continue, development becomes unavoidable.

Immigration control will not stop the developing crisis, as the local population itself has passed a 'tipping point" and is growing by over 250 people per year. Our government is offering no other solutions.

However, I will - starting with child benefits. A subject that I wish to treat very sensitively, such that noone currently alive will be affected, including any babies that are on the wav!

Historically, Jersey was depopulated at the end of the Second World War and, for obvious economic reasons, families were encouraged financially. Regrettably, in an island of limited space, government support for

large families is no longer in the overall public interest, so I would initially suggest that all current child benefits are retained for the first born, with the 2nd child getting 50% of that former amount. After that, there would be no restriction on family size, but parents should understand that they will incur full financial responsibility.

If anyone has a better idea, kindly let me know via my website guydefaye.com – where a number of my other policy suggestions are outlined

I would like to include them here, but – clearly – population pressures dominate ALL other matters.

I have fought against the negative "Jersey Way" - the cover-ups and recently the corruption committed by some rogue civil servants who have abused their positions,

perjured themselves in court or perverted the course of justice. I want to see these people in the Royal Court for what they have done - financially ruining some ordinary hard working people, causing them mental health problems and almost breaking up their families. I also want to hold to account those who have covered it up or failed to do their duty.

Population

Population growth is out of control and needs to be restricted and work permits without the right to permanently live in the Island introduced.

Housing

We need to provide more social and affordable housing - to rent and buy - so that our children can live an independent life in the island rather than be forced to live with their parents or leave the island.

Employment

Over the next 5, 10 or 20 years artificial intelligence, machine learning, robotics are expected to replace 45% of existing jobs. We must take steps now to mitigate the impact and plan for the future.

Economy

Brexit and Artificial Intelligence uncertainty requires major rethink.

We need to up-skill our workforce, assisting all those who wish to train in new fields/trades with financial assistance or courses and not merely fund students going to university. We must embrace life-long learning to adapt to the future and take advantage of any opportunities that may come our way.

Taxation

We need a fair taxation system and reverse the policy of making the burden fall on individuals, especially middle Jersey, rather than companies.

The Economy

The finance industry provides the mainstay of Jersey's employment and economic success and it is important that this position is maintained, and enhanced by embracing new technologies. Brexit

Housing

Home ownership is beyond the reach of many. I am in support of affordable housing for all, including key workers, and use of schemes such as share-ownership where suitable.

Health

Political approval has been given for the hospital to be built on the existing site, and funding arrangements agreed. Completing the new hospital is becoming more critical regarding patient care as time passes, and needs to be progressed once the planning application is settled.

Government

It is essential to have genuine transparency across States
Departments and Government, in order that the public have an understanding of where money is spent, and lines of accountability are clear. Firm control of public expenditure focused on customer service is required, with lean structures trimmed of unnecessary management positions.

Having policed St Helier for 25 years, I have a strong understanding of quality of life and public safety matters, and support the Honorary Police.

St.Helier

The Parish of St. Helier answers to rate-payers at monthly parish assemblies, but it has less control over development than would a district council in the UK.

Its well-researched recommendations for the treatment of Parish roads can be over-ridden by the States planning department, and it has little say in the treatment of building development on States roads that run through St.Helier.

With the Constable and others, I aim to improve on this, but our most pressing requirement is to limit the disruption which will arise through the construction of the new hospital.

Population

If Jersey is to retain its character we must aim for minimal population growth. About 1500 residents leave Jersey every year and we need to be specific about who should replace them under what conditions of residence. Having set those conditions we must apply them.

Minimum wage

From the mass of international academic literature in support of a reasonable minimum wage here is just one quotation. "There is a sense in which the functioning of the labour market represents an important social contract to which we are all signatories. Part of that contract says that if people work, and work hard, they should expect that their share of the final product will allow them to live a life of dignity."

Jobs

We need a layer between the demanding preconditions of full apprenticeship and the effective but short-term provisions of work experience. The Back to Work scheme and the Training and Enterprise Partnership show what can be done in specialist areas. We must offer vocational courses and in-work training properly suited to all who can benefit from them, and these should apply as much to 50-year-olds as to 20-year-olds

Long Term Care

The path from St. Saviours Hospital to long term care for my wife Felicity has been difficult. At one stage the timely intervention of a Reform Jersey States member was helpful. If elected I will be keen to provide similar support to others.

Road Safety

Improve transport provision

Many people living in the north of the parish would prefer to use the bus; unfortunately for some the walk to Temple Court is not achievable. As a consequence they use their car for the full journey to Town.

We should revisit the discussion with Liberty Bus and the Environment Department about the creation of local and commuter 'Park and Ride' services.

Investment in renewable energy

We are the sunniest place in the British Isles. Why are we not taking advantage of this?

The time has come to reduce our dependency on external electricity supply, and become more self sufficient. There should be an

incentive scheme that encourages householders to generate their own electricity and contribute to the island grid.

Home affairs

I would utilise my experience as a Centenier in the States Chamber when considering issues within the Criminal Justice system.

Health

I am concerned about the new hospital location, a brownfield site close to Town is preferable. The existing site could become green once the project is completed.

GP fees, mean that some families avoid seeking medical assistance until there is an emergency. Dental care for many has become unaffordable. A review of government's relationship with GP and Dental practices should be initiated.



Since the last election I have worked hard to honour the pledges I made, whilst also taking forward new initiatives.

The St Mary Walkable Village project has finally been delivered after more than 20 years of parochial campaigning and I have since worked on other local problem areas, making and following up submissions to the Infrastructure department accordingly.

I have endeavoured to bolster the sense of community, leading a team of volunteers which has organised a wide range of events, encouraging different groups of parishioners to come together. This has been

really successful and many people are becoming involved in parish life for the first time. I am particularly pleased that the young people at our Youth Club are participating widely, as I have supported the Youth Project consistently and was pleased to bring a Partnership Agreement to a Parish Assembly for funding approval.

To ensure that vulnerable parishioners are further considered, I am hoping to launch a community support group.

I have several other projects underway both in the parish and with an island focus:

Education - supporting existing parish childcare providers to maximise opportunities as a new nursery school unit is included in plans to rebuild St Mary's School. Education - backing moves to put

higher education funding onto a statutory basis.

Housing - undertaking preliminary work in revising St Mary's Village

Plan. There is potential to include further first-time buyer homes, subject to consultation and the agreement of parishioners.

Social Policy - having worked on the Access to Justice Review since early 2014, supporting the resulting draft Law due for debate on June 26th.

Infrastructure - investment in amenity space and infrastructure is vital for quality of life and the economy.

I have long been a critic of the ministerial system in its present form - it has not brought the benefits that were promised at the outset, our government has become more adversarial and simply put, the people of Jersey deserve better. I hope that changes to the machinery of government recently set in motion will lead to more opportunities for active participation for all Members, to enable their diverse skills and experience to be better utilised for the good of the Island.

In response to a Care Enquiry recommendation, PPC has lodged a proposition to define States Members' duties and it is clear that every Member must play a full part in making the Assembly function efficiently. In this term I have served on the Legislation Advisory Panel, the States Employment Board and as Chairman of the Planning Committee. With the rôle of the Constables in the States Assembly now settled by referendum, it is clear they must continue to combine their parish duties with responsibilities in the Assembly. Whilst my background and my heart is in the Parish, my experience allows me to balance the workload appropriately.

With your support I am ready to play my part, drawing particularly on the knowledge I have amassed in areas such as education and planning.



POPULATION.

The population must be managed at its current level. Our island simply cannot be continued to grow at its current rate. It is predicted the population to rise to 140400 by 2035 if immigration carries on at its current level. The states have a target of 300 individuals per annum but have no strategy in place to make sure that it happens.

PARISH HOUSE PURCHASE SCHEMES FOR LOCAL PEOPLE.

The current schemes for first time buyers for people with parish connections should continue. This is a justifiable way of maintaining local communities and help us stem the flow of local people having to leave the island. Full Jersey passport holders are prevented from benefiting in the EU, as such Jersey people have substantially fewer options as to where they can live. Therefore, they should have their rights to schemes such as these protected at all costs.

GRANTS

Jersey spends a considerable amount of money on offering grants and incentives for people to come to live and work in Jersey. I would like to see a scheme set up to encourage local people to bridge the skills gap from within and make grants etc available to local people allowing us to strengthen and maintain the local community.

The new Assembly will consider a new Island Plan and I have the experience of interpreting this and can advise members which polices do and do not work for Jersey.

Scrutiny

I chaired the Education and Home Affairs Scrutiny Panel and as a result extra provision for children with severe autism was created.

I have always championed the issue of university funding for our students and during this term I secured £2M for this, which was insufficient however following 2 reviews from our Education Scrutiny Panel the Ministers were

forced to address the issue and funding will now be available.

Road safety

I campaigned for crossings on Longueville Road. Funding has been set aside for this project for 2018.

Local Schools

I assist local schools with their citizenship program and attend their events regularly.

States Assembly

Representing my constituency is a great responsibility which is reflected in my 99% voting record.

I believe that all children should be supported and empowered but our education system is struggling and our children suffer. Teachers and support staff are unsupported and underfunded. They are fighting a continual battle to be heard. If elected, I would propose a major overhaul of our education system and the staff within it so that our children have every possible support to reach their goals.

The cost of living in Jersey means that many families struggle to pay rent, meet the bills or even do the weekly shop. I know this from first-hand experience. An unexpected bill or a doctor's appointment can throw everything off for the whole month. There has been a huge increase for charities which

Communication lines need to be open between all departments so we are better able to provide help quickly and effectively without causing unnecessary suffering to those in need of support.

As a direct result of these policies, economic growth has stalled, wages have stagnated, the number of households living in relative poverty has increased and families have found it more and more difficult to make ends meet.
