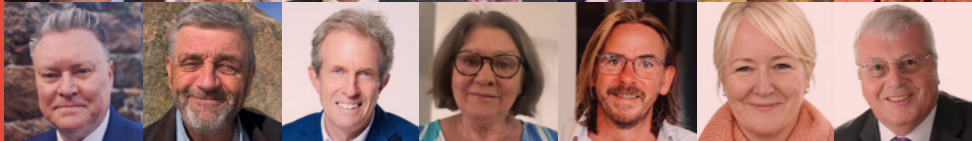

# ELECTION INFORMATION

On Sunday 7 June 2026, Islanders will be able to elect 49 States Members for the next four years – 9 Senators, 12 Connétables, and 28 Deputies.

This booklet contains the manifestos of all 92 candidates who have put themselves forward for election.

## Who can vote?

You do not need to manually register to vote as Jersey has introduced a system of automatic voter registration.

You are eligible and should have been automatically added to the electoral register if you are aged 16 or over and have lived in Jersey for:

- 12 months on Election Day (Sunday 7 June 2026); or
- 6 months on Election Day, plus periods that total 5 years.

You do not have to be a British citizen to be eligible to vote in Jersey.

### THE ELECTORAL REGISTER - IMPORTANT CHANGE:

The register is based on data held by the Government. If you have left the Island for several months and not told the Government you're back, or moved house and not informed anyone, we encourage you to check your details on the register by contacting your Parish or checking online at [Vote.je](https://www.vote.je).

You could find that you are still registered at your old address and only able to vote in that Parish/Constituency. This could change the candidates that you are eligible to vote for and where you should go to vote. If any of this might apply to you, please check at your Parish Hall or online as soon as you can.

## Who you can vote for

There are three different types of States Member to vote for:

### Senator

Vote for up to nine candidates to represent the whole Island.

### Connétable

Vote for one candidate to represent your Parish.

### Deputy

Vote for between two to four candidates depending on your constituency.

For the role of Deputy, Jersey is divided into nine constituencies. To check which constituency you live in, visit [Vote.je](https://www.vote.je) and enter your postcode on our Constituency Finder or contact your Parish Hall.



## None of the Candidates:

'None of the candidates' (also referred to as 'none of the above') is an option available to voters only when there are either the same number of candidates as vacancies, or fewer candidates than vacancies. Having this option on the ballot paper means that candidates are not automatically elected without opposition.

This provides you with an opportunity to voice your opinion on the candidates if you do not feel that they share your views and values, as an alternative to just not voting. Choosing 'none of the candidates' is a vote against all of the candidates running for that position.

If 'none of the candidates' receives the most votes, no one will be elected and there will be a by-election later. If you have any questions about this option, please email [contact@vote.je](mailto:contact@vote.je).

## Asking the candidates questions

### Hustings

Hustings are a great opportunity to hear each candidate's manifesto and to ask them questions about the issues you care about in person. All the hustings will be live streamed via YouTube and recordings will be available to watch on the Vote.je YouTube channel so you can watch them after they have taken place. Hustings have been scheduled to take place even when there is only one candidate.

All events will start at 7pm and will conclude by 9pm at the latest.

## Voting

### Before Election Day

Anyone who was registered to vote before 17 April 2026 will be on the main electoral register and can vote before Election Day by:

#### Post

If you applied to vote by post before the 12 noon deadline on 30 April 2026:

- Ballot papers and a ballot paper envelope will start being sent out from mid-May. Mark an 'x' in the box alongside the name(s) of your preferred candidate(s), or 'none of the candidates' if this is available and it is your preferred option (see previous explanation).
- Put the ballot papers inside the return envelope and post it back to the Judicial Greffe, to be received no later than 12 noon on Sunday 7 June 2026.



### **IMPORTANT:**

- Once registered for postal voting, voters will be disqualified from voting in person at the polling station unless they take the postal ballot papers that were originally sent to them to the polling station. No additional ballot papers will be provided at the polling station.
- If a voter changes address after applying for a postal vote, it is their responsibility to inform the Postal & Pre-Poll Voting Manager by emailing [VotingApplications@courts.je](mailto:VotingApplications@courts.je) or calling +44 1534 441300.

### **Early voting (pre-poll)**

If you missed the postal voting deadline of Thursday 30 April you can still vote before Election Day at pre-poll.

Voters from any Parish or constituency can vote during the week before the election at St. Paul's Centre, St. Paul's Gate, in between Dumaresq Street and New Street, St. Helier.

Early voting (pre-poll) will be open from 8.45am to 5pm from Tuesday 26 May – Friday 29 May, and from 8.45am – 12 noon on Monday 1 June 2026.

### **Disability - friendly**

St. Paul's Centre has disabled parking spaces immediately outside the building, lift access to take voters to the first floor and magnifiers and lamps to assist voters with visual impairments. If you or someone you care for have additional needs, please email [VotingApplications@courts.je](mailto:VotingApplications@courts.je) and the team will do their utmost to help.

### **Voter ID**

Please bring photo ID (passport/driving licence) with you to your polling station (including early voting/pre-poll) as this will be the quickest way to check you in and receive your ballot papers.

If you don't have a passport or driving licence, please take an alternative form of ID (this could include a work ID, a phone that allows you to log in to Yoti/Jersey Me, utility bill, etc.).

If you arrive without any ID, the Electoral Administrator will seek to verify your identity using their Parish records, but please note this may take a little longer.

### **Voting on Election Day**

If you are registered to vote at any point before 28 May 2026 you can vote on Election Day – Sunday 7 June – at your allocated polling station which will be open from 8am to 8pm.

If you are not sure which polling station you should attend, you can check on [Vote.je](http://Vote.je) or contact your Parish Hall. Your Parish Hall will also be able to answer any questions you may have about accessing your polling station. When you arrive at the polling station or pre-poll voting station you will be asked for your name to check you off on the electoral register.

You will be given 3 ballot papers and asked to go to the voting booth to cast your vote by putting an 'x' beside the name(s) of your preferred candidate(s) or 'none of the candidates' if this is an option (see previous explanation).

## Voting if you are sick on Election Day

If you are sick, incapacitated or have challenges with literacy, or if you are the carer of someone who falls into these categories and cannot have voted by post, you can request a home visit. Parishes can send an official to you to take your vote so that registered voters are not prevented from participating due to sickness. You can find all parish contact details on [Vote.je/contact-us](https://www.vote.je/contact-us).

## Polling Stations

On Sunday 7 June, you can only vote at your allocated polling station, so it's important to check where to go before heading out to vote. Your polling station is allocated based on your home address on the electoral register. To check which polling station you need to attend, please visit your parish website.

# INFORMAÇÕES SOBRE ELEIÇÕES

No domingo, 7 de junho de 2026, os residentes poderão eleger 49 Membros de Estado para os próximos quatro anos – 9 Senadores, 12 Presidentes de Câmara/Connétables e 28 Deputados.

Este folheto contém os manifestos de todos os 92 candidatos que se candidataram às eleições.

## Quem pode votar?

Não é necessário registar-se manualmente para votar, pois Jersey introduziu um sistema de registo automático de eleitores.

É elegível e deveria ter sido automaticamente adicionado ao registo eleitoral se tiver 16 anos ou mais e tiver vivido em Jersey há:

- 12 meses no Dia das Eleições (domingo, 7 de junho de 2026); ou
- 6 meses no Dia das Eleições, mais períodos que totalizam 5 anos.

Não é preciso ser cidadão britânico para poder votar em Jersey.

### MUDANÇA IMPORTANTE PARA AS ELEIÇÕES DE 2026:

O registo baseia-se em dados detidos pelo Governo. Se saiu da Ilha durante vários meses e não informou o Governo do seu regresso, ou mudou-se de casa e não informou ninguém, encorajamo-lo a verificar os seus dados no registo contactando a sua Câmara Municipal ou consultando online em [Vote.je](http://Vote.je).

Pode descobrir que ainda está registado na sua antiga morada e só pode votar nesse Município/Círculo Eleitoral. Isto pode alterar os candidatos por quem tem direito a votar e onde deve votar. Se alguma destas informações se aplicar a si, por favor verifique na sua Câmara Municipal ou online assim que possível.

## Em quem pode votar

Existem três tipos diferentes de Membros de Estado em quem pode votar:

### Senador

Vote em até nove candidatos para representar toda a Ilha

### Presidente de Câmara/Connétable

Vote num candidato para representar a sua Câmara

### Deputado

Vote entre dois a quatro candidatos, dependendo do seu círculo eleitoral.

## Votação

### Antes do Dia das Eleições

Qualquer pessoa que estivesse registada para votar antes de 17 de abril de 2026 estará no registo eleitoral principal e poderá votar antes do Dia das Eleições por:

#### Correio

Se se candidatou para votar por correio antes do prazo do meio-dia, 30 de abril de 2026:

- Os boletins de voto e um envelope de boletim começarão a ser enviados a partir de meados de maio. Marque um 'x' na caixa ao lado do(s) nome(s) seu(s) candidato(s) preferido(s), ou 'nenhum dos candidatos' se estiver disponível e for a sua opção preferida (ver explicação anterior).
- Coloque os boletins de voto dentro do envelope de retorno e envie-os de volta ao Greffe Judicial, para serem recebidos até, no máximo, ao meio-dia do domingo, 7 de junho de 2026.



### **IMPORTANTE:**

- Uma vez registados para votação por correspondência, os eleitores serão desqualificados para votar pessoalmente na mesa de voto, a menos que leve os boletins de voto postais que lhes foram originalmente enviados para a mesa. Não serão fornecidos boletins adicionais na mesa de voto.
- Se um eleitor mudar de morada após pedir um voto postal, é sua responsabilidade informar o Gestor de Votação Postal e Pré-Eleitoral enviando um email [votingapplications@courts.je](mailto:votingapplications@courts.je) ou ligando para +44 1534 441300.

### **Votação antecipada (antecipação)**

Se perdeu o prazo de votação por correspondência de quinta-feira, 30 de abril, ainda pode votar antes do Dia das Eleições na votação antecipada.

Eleitores de qualquer Câmara ou círculo eleitoral podem votar durante a semana anterior à eleição no St. Paul's Centre, St. Paul's Gate, entre a Dumaresq Street e a New Street, St. Helier.

A votação antecipada (antecipação) estará aberta das 8h45 às 17h de terça-feira, 26 de maio a sexta-feira, 29 de maio, e das 8h45 ao meio-dia na segunda-feira, 1 de junho de 2026.

### **Acessível a pessoas com mobilidade reduzida**

O St. Paul's Centre tem lugares de estacionamento para pessoas com mobilidade reduzida imediatamente fora do edifício, acesso por elevador para levar os eleitores ao primeiro andar e lupas e lâmpadas para ajudar eleitores com deficiência visual. Se você ou alguém de quem cuida tiver necessidades adicionais, por favor envie um email para [VotingApplications@courts.je](mailto:VotingApplications@courts.je) e a equipa fará tudo para ajudar.

### **Identificação do Eleitor**

Por favor, traga consigo um documento de identificação com fotografia (passaporte/carta de condução) para a sua mesa de voto, pois esta será a forma mais rápida de fazer a verificação e receber os seus boletins de voto.

Se não tiver passaporte ou carta de condução, por favor leve um documento de identificação alternativo (isto pode incluir um cartão de identificação de trabalho, um telemóvel que permita iniciar sessão no Yoti/Jersey Me, conta de serviços de luz ou água, etc.).

Se chegar sem qualquer identificação, o Administrador Eleitoral procurará verificar a sua identidade usando os seus registos municipais, mas por favor note que isso pode demorar um pouco mais.

### **Votação no Dia das Eleições**

Se esteve registado para votar em qualquer momento antes de 28 de maio de 2026, pode votar no Dia das Eleições – domingo, 7 de junho – na sua mesa de voto atribuída, que estará aberta das 8h às 20h.

Se não tiver a certeza em que mesa de voto deve votar, pode verificar [Vote.je](http://Vote.je) ou contactar a sua Câmara Municipal. A sua Câmara Municipal também poderá responder a quaisquer dúvidas que possa ter sobre o acesso à sua mesa de voto. Quando chegar à mesa de voto ou à mesa de voto antecipada, será solicitado o seu nome para assinalar o seu registo eleitoral.

Receberá 3 boletins de voto e poderão dirigir-se à cabine de voto para votar, colocando um 'x' ao lado do(s) nome(s) seu(s) candidato(s) preferido(s) ou 'nenhum dos candidatos' (ver explicação anterior).

## Votar se estiver doente no Dia das Eleições

Se estiver inesperadamente doente/incapacitado no dia da eleição, as Paróquias podem enviar um responsável para que vote para que os eleitores registados não sejam impedidos de participar devido a doença. Thanks to the good people of St Saviour, I was elected Deputy for the past political term, and have now decided to put my name forward for the recently re-established role of Senator.

When I stood for election four years ago, I made a manifesto pledge to 'seek whatever position of responsibility that I could obtain'.

Previously centralised functions like Finance, HR, Digital, Procurement and the Ambulance Service have now been returned to the Health Service, creating a more integrated operation. And much progress has also been made to improve Medicines regulation.

Our Team has also designed and appointed a Health Partnership Board to bring the various sectors of health together (Hospital, GPs, Health Charities, Home Care, Care Homes, Pharmacy etc) allowing all parties to contribute to the design and function of the entire service.

Work on the new Hospital has progressed well, with site preparation continuing whilst we finalise details for the signing of a construction contract. Hopefully, quite soon.

Throughout this political term, I've learned a great deal about the functions of government, its strengths and weaknesses, and the areas of work that we should, and should not be doing. I also have some clear ideas of where, and how, money could be saved - and how the system could be made more efficient.

I believe our island has become complacent. The political system has spent far too much time focused on spending money and far too little on creating it. This has to change.

Heritage Lets currently makes over £150,000 per year, which helpfully contributes to my previous six years as a States Member.

Although I have an Honours degree in Law, I switched my career path to print, radio and television journalism at local, national and international level. Commencing with Channel TV, I moved to England and worked for Sky, London Radio, ITN World News, CNBC Business News and Euronews (based in Lyon, France) across all levels of production.

I recently highlighted the contamination by Perfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in our Island's drinking water and, after years of complacency, this matter is now being taken seriously. Sadly, our government insists on describing our tap water as "safe", when the evidence suggests otherwise. Jersey Water's PFAS pollution level comes in below international guidelines - which does not make our water safe, it simply renders it legal. Few people know the full extent of Jersey's PFAS pollution, but I understand that it is in all the Island's streams and may impact agricultural land.

I am additionally concerned over the manner in which we treat Jersey's elderly residents having had experience as a domestic carer. It is clear that there are insufficient care homes in the Island and other provisions, such as "respite care" are under pressure. This is just one of dozens of local issues that need addressing. I intend to pursue those topics over the duration of the hustings meetings.

Low-cost housing for young people continues to be a major problem, not just for St Ouen but the island as a whole. The future issue is likely to be the over supply of low cost housing at increasing costs, and we could be heading towards a social housing crisis.

Mains drains and water supply is inadequate in almost every one of the rezoned land sites of the Bridging Island Plan. Residents continue to be let down by local authorities. Residents shouldn't be expected to pay £45k to connect to mains water 800 metres away. It will cost

£500k to resolve this issue. This is an island-wide problem that demands Government support.

I was delighted to introduce the recycling scheme in 2024 to St Ouen. We were able to implement the scheme using existing human resources, and credit is deserved to all involved, not least our residents who have embraced it enthusiastically.

If reelected, I will continue to put the Parish of St Ouen at the forefront of everything I do. I have sat on the Planning Committee, Scrutiny Panel and played an integral role in the Firearms Review during this term. However, I see the role of Connétable as a Ministerial post in itself and my focus will remain entirely on looking after people's needs, rather than seeking a position as Minister or Deputy Minister.

Dear voter,

I want to write to you directly — not with a list of policies (you'll find those at [jonathanrenouf.je](http://jonathanrenouf.je)) — but with an honest account of what I believe is at stake on June 7th, and why I'm asking for one of your three votes.

These are difficult times. The world feels unstable, the cost of living is squeezing household budgets, and Jersey feels like it is losing what makes it special. St Brelade is not immune. I see it on the doorstep: the worry, the frustration, and — underneath it all — a real desire for something better.

But difficult moments are also moments of choice and opportunity.

I believe in government that is honest about what it costs and disciplined about what it spends. The public sector has grown faster than our economy can comfortably sustain and that cannot go on. But I am wary of simplistic solutions — arbitrary cuts hurt real people. The answer is to be smarter: invest where we need to, cut where there is waste, protect what we truly value.

This is my home parish — I grew up in St Brelade and now my wife and I are raising our family here, so protecting what makes St Brelade special matters deeply to me. Our coastline and our countryside are not obstacles to progress, they are part of what we are. We must always remember that growth is only worthwhile if it improves our lives, not if it sacrifices what we value most.

Our parish has significant opportunities ahead. The redevelopment of the Elephant Park, the future of Les Creux and improving Quennevais

Parade are all decisions that belong to this community, and I will fight to make sure your voices shape them. I know we also have challenges: deteriorating local facilities, anti social behaviour, and the disheartening feeling that decisions are made elsewhere by people who don't always listen. That's why as your deputy, I have held more than 50 parish drop-ins and taken up dozens of issues on your behalf.

I haven't always got things right. My attempt to introduce stronger tree protection as Environment Minister is something on which I reflect. The goal was right — Jersey's trees need better protection — but I moved too fast and didn't bring people with me. I learned from that.

Jersey faces huge strategic challenges at this time of uncertainty. Brexit, external economic shocks, and geopolitical events have all taken their toll. highest internet speeds free of charge, and Jersey Electricity to hold off on price increases.

\*When residents at Spencer Close faced eviction notices on Christmas Eve, I authorised Andium’s purchase of the site, ensuring people could remain in their homes.

\*I also played a leading role in launching the Spend Local Card, supporting households through rising costs while boosting local businesses.

\*I backed community initiatives such as the development of Padel facilities at FB Fields, helping expand opportunities for sport and wellbeing.

These are just some of the things I have delivered...but my focus is firmly on the future.

We must tackle the cost of living by cutting unnecessary bureaucracy and creating the right environment for businesses to grow.

Its little wonder younger people are finding it impossible to save for deposits. Wages have stagnated while rents have soared. Increasingly, younger people no longer see the island as a viable option to raise a family, while birth numbers have fallen to their lowest since records began, driven partly by exorbitant childcare costs. The status quo is clearly unsustainable and if we don't reverse these trends, it is no exaggeration to say we face an existential threat to our future prosperity and social cohesion.

## Priorities

I served as an Audit Partner with Deloitte and have worked in the Jersey Financial Services sector. My public sector background includes three years as Projects Director for the States' Treasury Department and a decade-long tenure as Treasurer Trustee for the Jersey Employment Trust

I have lived in Jersey since 2003 and live in St. Saviour. For many Jersey has become worryingly expensive and less attractive than it was. I want to help change that. This requires Jersey to have strong, efficient and competent government. Expenditure should be prudent and represent value for money. The books must be balanced. The States Assembly should encourage new and existing businesses to prosper.

## Key Policy Objectives

The primary concern of most people living in the Island is the high cost of living. To tackle this I propose the following objectives:

- **Grow the economy:** The Assembly must look at ways of supporting islanders and small businesses by reviewing taxes, social security and fuel duties. Any changes in income to the government must be balanced by reducing public expenditure and increasing income elsewhere by growing the economy, cutting red tape, removing unnecessary regulations, and attracting high-tech, AI and other businesses to the Island.
- **Housing Reform:** To support the young

and less well-off, Leck proposes extending first-time buyer assistance to include mortgage relief, encompassing all property types, encouraging further development of affordable houses and developing derelict greenhouse sites from which Development Land Taxes could be raised.

- **Immigration & Workforce:** To help increase the working population Leck suggests widening immigration policies to ensure those with non-specialist skills can live in Jersey if they have gainful employment. He also proposes simplifying residential statuses and abolishing “non-qualified” property designations.
- **Health.** Improve patient pathways, preventative services, accountability and access to specialist care. Complete the hospital developments cost effectively and efficiently.

## Commitment to St. Saviour

Additionally, the quality of life for St. Saviour parishioners can be improved by addressing road conditions, safety and late-night speeding and looking at the creation of other community areas in addition to the proposed Parish Hall Community Park.

For the last 40 years, I have been a local hospitality leader, running the Hotel de France. While we have adapted to meet the changing needs of our community, our government has not. Now, too many people on our island are being left behind as we face serious economic challenges. That is why I am running to be your Deputy in St Saviour.

After school, I studied accountancy and joined Coopers & Lybrand. ## How many candidates can I vote for?

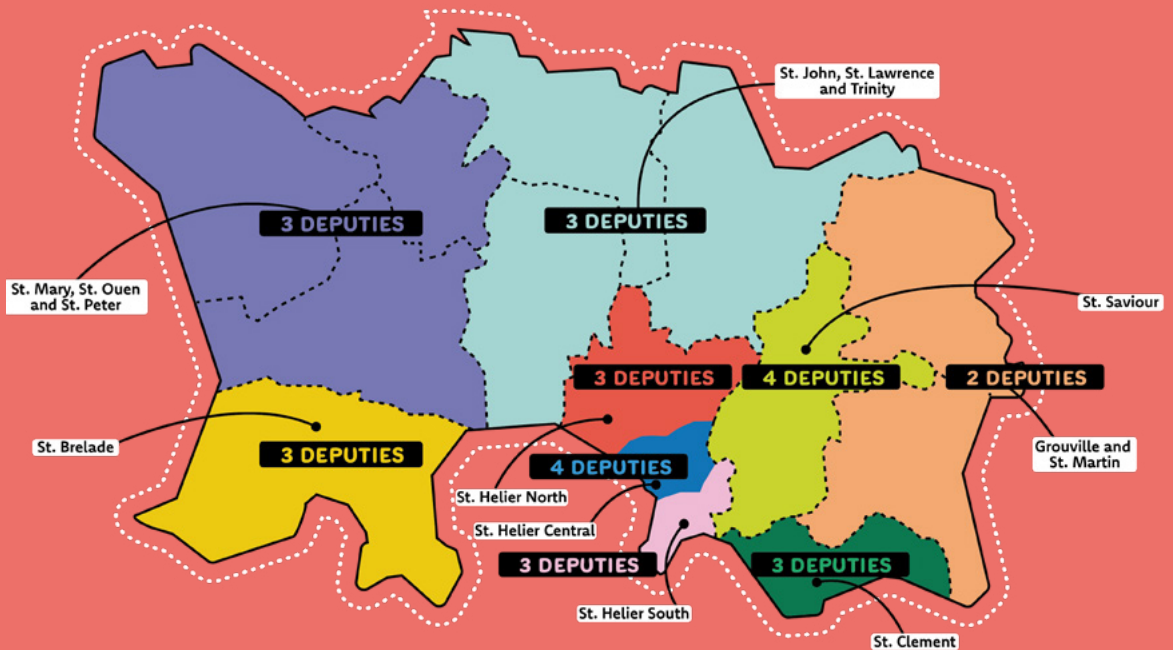
The total number of people you can vote for depends on where you live. Everyone can vote for up to 9 Senatorial candidates and one Connétable candidate.

Deputies are elected to represent a constituency. There are nine constituencies in Jersey. These are formed based on population numbers so that each Deputy represents approximately the same number of Islanders. Some constituencies are made up of multiple Parishes; some are a single Parish. As the most-populated area of Jersey, St. Helier is split into three separate constituencies.

The table below explains how many people you can vote for based on the parish you live in.
